The Trustees will be looking to make a fresh set of grants to such students at their next meeting the date of which is not yet known. CHURCH NEWS Dear All,

I am delighted to be able to write my first article for the varying parish magazines which go out across the Wilford Peninsula. For those of you who may not know me, my name is Rev. Greg and I am an Assistant Curate in The Wilford Benefice serving mainly within the Rendlesham Cluster.

As I write this, we have just celebrated the feast of Pentecost - also known as 'The Birthday of the Church'. At St. Felix Church in Rendlesham we had a joyous service for Pentecost with some wonderful flame inspired crafts and crowns creatively made by the children. Rev Mandy and I were fortunate enough to have crowns made for us to wear too!

The Day of Pentecost marks fifty days since Easter Day and brings the Easter season to an end. The name of the day itself is derived from the Greek word "pentecoste," meaning 50th.

Pentecost often evokes vivid imagery of wind, fire, and divine inspiration. Traditionally associated with the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the apostles, it is symbolized by tongues of flame and the speaking of many languages. Wearing red, celebrating with lively worship, and feeling united with Christians everywhere make this one of the most vibrant and meaningful events in the Christian year.

Pentecost is a celebration that marks the beginning of the Church and reminds us of the moment when the Holy Spirit filled the followers of Jesus with courage and purpose. It's a story of people from many places and languages coming together, united by something bigger than themselves. Today, in a world that often feels divided and uncertain, Pentecost asks us: how does this affect us here and today? Well I think it encourages us to think about how we can bring people together, listen to each other, and share hope in our communities. Pentecost isn't just a story from the past—it's a call to action for how we live and care for one another in the here and the now.

For those of you who watch the news, what happens outside of Suffolk, or even the UK, can seem extremely unnerving, terrifying and desperately sad. During a recent clergy training event we were asked to reflect on where we had sensed God's presence in our day to day lives and interactions as well as where we had sensed God's absence. I had been watching the BBC News on TV only two days beforehand, and as the stories unfolded, I felt a deep sense of despondency. So many reports were filled with heartbreak—conflict, suffering, and fear etched into the faces of people caught in terrible situations. It was overwhelming to see just how much sadness and terror there is in the world right now, and it left me feeling heavy and helpless. So when asked where do I see God's absence I talked about some of the situations I had seen and how helpless it had left me feeling. But even in the darkest valleys, God has not abandoned the world. He is working — in the hearts of the faithful who remain, in the courage of peacemakers, in the hands of those offering food, shelter, and prayer. His Spirit moves through broken places, redeeming and restoring in ways we may not always see.

However my colleague was able to help me work through this, and I then realsied that perhaps there's another layer of God's whisper in all this: a calling not just to grieve for the distant, but to reflect on our own neighborhoods, relationships, and communities. So yes, we must pray for those suffering overseas. We must give, advocate, and remain informed. But we must also ask ourselves: How can the Holy Spirit work through me in those places nearby where I can make a difference? Where I can make a difference in bringing about peace, love and unity. And often it can be those spontaneous, random acts of kindness - they may be small in scale but big in impact — and they can ripple out further than you realise.

Pentecost reminds us that God's Spirit is not distant or reserved for the few — it is poured out on *all* who believe. On that day, the early church was filled with boldness, unity, and a burning desire to share God's love. Today, we are invited to live in that same Spirit — to speak hope, build bridges, and be led by God's power in our ordinary lives. Pentecost isn't just a moment in

history; it's a call to carry the flame forward — to let the Holy Spirit work through us as we strive to bring peace, love and kindness to as many people as we can. We may not be able to fix everything in the world, but we can make a real difference by loving well and bringing peace right where we are.

So let us not only mark Pentecost on that 50th day after Easter Day, but each and every day by letting God's love flow through us wherever we go.
